- Berlin, Ira; Favreau, Mark; and Miller, Steven F., ed. *Remembering Slavery: African Americans Talk About Their Personal Experiences of Slavery and Emancipation*. New York: The New Press, in association with the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C., 1998.
- Donald, David Herbert, *Lincoln*. Touchstone Books, 1996. A portrayal of Lincoln the politician.
- Douglass, Frederick, *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass, an American Slave, Written by Himself*. Authoritative Text, Contents, Criticism. Norton Critical Edition. New York: W. W. Norton & Co., 1977. Probably the best known and most widely read of all slave narratives.
- Franklin, John Hope and Schweninger, Loren. *Runaway Slaves: Rebels on the Plantation*. New York: Oxford University Press, 1999. Winner of the 2000 Lincoln Prize. Increases the body of knowledge and understanding of slavery by revealing comprehensive accounts of slave resistance.
- Hedrick, Joan D. *Harriet Beecher Stowe: A Life*. New York: Oxford University Press, 1994. Pulitzer Prize Winning biography of the author by Trinity College professor; meticulously researched and highly readable.
- Hedrick, Joan D., ed. *The Oxford Harriet Beecher Stowe Reader*. New York: Oxford University Press, 1999. A focused selection of Stowe's writing from the 1830's through the 1860's. Particularly suited for courses in 19th century American literature, women's literature and American history. Highlights selections best suited for classroom use and is divided into three sections: (1) Early Sketches; (2) Anti-slavery Writings; and (3) Domestic Culture and Politics.
- King, Wilma. *Stolen Childhood: Slave Youth in 19th Century America (Blacks in the Diaspora)*. Indiana University Press, 1998. Using sources such as personal papers and U.S. government interviews with former slaves compiled in the 1930's, Ms. King documents the effects of slavery on enslaved children.
- McKittrick, Eric L., ed. *Slavery Defended: The Views of the Old South*. Englewood Cliffs: Prentice-Hall, Inc., 1963. Fifteen of the most influential figures of the ante-bellum South defend slavery as a system of labor and as a social institution. Includes letters, reviews, debates, treatises and poetry.
- Oates, Stephen B. *With Malice Toward None: A Life of Abraham Lincoln*. Harper Perennial Library, 1994. Lincoln Portrayed as a great Patriot and as a human being. Covers all of the big decisions made before, during and after the Civil War.

Perrin, Pat, ed. *Slavery*. From Series: *Researching American History*. Carlisle, MA: Discovery Enterprises, Ltd., 2000. A collection of excerpts of slave narratives, government documents, songs, and other firsthand accounts of the early slave trade, passage from Africa, life as a slave and stories from Underground Railroad. Each excerpt is summarized alongside the document and has a vocabulary list of challenging words. Appropriate for middle school students.

Stowe, Harriet Beecher. *A Key to Uncle Tom's Cabin; Presenting the Original Facts and Documents Upon Which the Story is Founded. Together With Corroborative Statements Verifying The Truth of the Work*. Bedford, MA: Applewood Books. Harriet Beecher Stowe wrote this book in defense of those who questioned the basis of truth of her novel, *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. Includes a comprehensive collection of her research material.

Stowe, Harriet Beecher. *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. Ed. By Elizabeth Ammons. New York: W.W. Norton & Co., 1994. The Norton edition includes a thorough introduction, an unedited version of the novel and a significant collection of responses to the novel.

Yetman, Norma R., ed. *Voices From Slavery: 100 Authentic Slave Narratives*. Dover Publications, 2000. The book includes interviews of slaves who lived on plantations throughout the slaveholding states.
